Rules that the **PUBLIC** has an opportunity to influence



When to contact


Timing is important

1. A bill is read and referred to committee (1st reading)


2. Committees consider, debate, and amend bills

3. If the bill makes it out committee, it gets a 2nd reading, when the whole chamber considers, debates, and amends

4. They then vote on final, amended version (3rd reading)

How often?

When should you contact your legislators?

1 - Connect very early on in the session

 This is a general communication: This is my situation /hope /goal /. Will you support this?

2 - Comment when a bill is heard/dropped

 This is a more focused conversation: I support this bill. It addresses my situation; I hope I can count on your support as it makes its way through the chamber

3 - Remind them as the bill nears a vote

• This is a more focused conversation:

The bill I care so much about made it this far, I hope I can count on your support to get it to the finish line. Please let me know if you need additional information.

4 – Thank them

 Also thank allies as the bill moves through the process (sponsors and cosponsors; people who pass it out of committee; if you know, to people who got it pulled to the floor ...)

The importance of budget


People have 2 options to publicly weigh in on a budget proposal

- Very start of session, by responding to the governor's proposal
- 2. At the very end of session, when the budget is 98% negotiated

WHO> I am Ramona Hattendorf with The Arc of King County, speaking in support of HB 1980. The Arc protects and promotes the rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and helps build inclusive communities. We serve the 36,000 people with IDD across King County.

<ISSUE> Our state's insistence on either/or when it comes to day services has isolated people and undermined their wellbeing. We require people to choose employment support OR community inclusion when often they need both.

WHY I CARE> DDA services are habilitative. This means helping people learn, keep, or maintain skills that are not typically developing. People with IDD need ongoing skill support throughout their lives.

Day services help people maintain essential skills needed to support well-being and interact with their community.

<WHY AUDIENCE SHOULD CARE> Employment support is a great day service. But lots of people need a "yes, AND …" approach.

Maybe they have severe anxiety *and* could benefit from community inclusion during a job search. Maybe they have a job, but it is only a few hours a week *and* they need additional skill maintenance outside it. Or maybe they lost their job, have no immediate prospects, but need support looking for a job while also still engaging in the community.

This bill is a "yes, AND ..." approach so people get the support mix they need for their situation. Same hours of support; flexibility for their situation.

<ACTION> Please support and move this bill this session. Thank you.

<ISSUE> Our state's insistence on either/or when it comes to day services has isolated people and undermined their well-being.

Why I care> DDA services are habilitative. This means helping people learn, keep, or maintain skills that are not typically developing.

Day services help people maintain essential life skills needed to support well-being and interact with their community. **Why audience should care>** Employment support is a great day service. But lots of people need a "yes, AND …" approach.

Maybe they have severe anxiety *and* could benefit from community inclusion during a job search. Maybe they have a job, but it is only a few hours a week, *and* need additional skill maintenance outside it.

<Action> This bill is a "yes, AND ..." approach so people get the support mix they need for their situation. Please pass out of committee this session. Thank you.

Let's practice



- Remove the arbitrary 13.5% funding cap
- Increase the multipliers (preK to 12) to close the gap between local spending and state funding
- Add \$5 million to expand Inclusionary Practices Project



- Keep the cap, but increase it to 15%
- Only increase preschool special education funding, not K-12
- Add \$5 million for professional development for inclusive classroom practices, but prioritize teacher mentors, not the Inclusionary Practices Program.
 Money would first go to schools with lowest LRE rates


Remember! Framing is important


