This is the third sequence of the 2024 Inclusion Academy. Earlier this year we explored:


- Accessibility & belonging in public schools, and







POLICY IN MOTION

This quote is from a news article about a budget item a city council member proposed:

"I think that shallow subsidies really meet that segment of the population experiencing homelessness that isn't sick enough or dependent enough to get free and ready access to all of the services available that we fund through public programs."

- PUBLIC OFFICIAL X

Shallow subsidy:

Offers a set percentage of rental support over a defined time, differentiating it from traditional rapid rehousing and homelessness prevention

A response posted on social media, about that quote:

"Yea. <u>not true</u>, when my children and I were homeless it flat out did not matter that the stress was increasing my 5-year-old son's seizure disorder and causing him to have up to 100 seizures a day. Even more dangerous, being we were homeless and spending our days at public places while he would fall and seize non-stop. No one expedited housing services for him.

"Does she want to talk about other services for him and how LONG it took: SSI? DDA? Head Start inclusion? Seattle Children's referral. Etc. etc. etc. PUBLIC OFFICIAL X is clearly disconnected from our community."

Reconciliation. House and Senate must agree on what the bill says. If what passed one chamber differs from the other, then legislators must negotiate changes, or the bill dies

Law. House and Senate leaders sign. The governor can then sign the bill into law, or may veto all or part of it. If the governor fails to act on the bill, it may become law without a signature.



Please note: Dates in this graphic are from the 2024 session. The legislature has not yet voted on a cutoff calendar for the 2025 session

And they're off ... bill making

1. Bill is "read" and referred to committee

- 2. Chair decides if a bill will be heard. Not all will be heard (Public comment opportunity)
- 3. Chair decides whether to call a vote. Not all will be voted on (Good bets: Mass appeal!)

And they're off ... bill making

- 4. Committee members offer and vote on amendments. (No public comment). They vote on the bill. It may be referred to fiscal committee.
- 5. Goes to Rules committee. Someone from Rules needs to "pull" the bill for it to go to the full chamber for consideration. Not all get pulled (Great time to have champions)

And they're off ... bill making

- 6. Goes to "floor" (full chamber). <mark>Leadership</mark> decides when/ whether to vote. Not all will be voted on (Great time to have champions)
- 7. Any member can offer a floor amendments, including "strikers" (Are there opponents behind the scenes?)

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Another way to influence ...

Join a citizens committee or advisory body.

This is especially helpful if you want to help inform administrative rules or the executive branch

Petitions and mass alerts

- If there is a big response, mass alerts or petitions can show there is a constituency.
 They are a show of power.
- If you want your individual voice heard, then testify, call, or send a note. If you use an action alert, change the subject line and make sure what you uniquely have to say is on top



1 AN ACT Relating to adult family home specialty services; amending 2 RCW 70.128.010 and 70.128.230; adding new sections to chapter 70.128 3 RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 70.128
6 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the developmental disabilities administration within the department shall work with stakeholders to design and 10 implement services for individuals living in adult family homes who have a primary need of care related to a developmental or 12 intellectual disability. Brief Summary of Second Substitute Bill (As Amended by House)

- Directs the Developmental Disabilities Administration and the Aging and Long-Term Support Administration to develop services for: (1) individuals living in adult family homes whose primary care needs relate to a developmental or intellectual disability; or (2) individuals living in adult family homes that are dedicated solely to caring for persons with dementia.
- Establishes an adult family home training network to make required training available for adult family homes.

Influencing the process

Offer ideas for bills and amendments

Testify, write or call when it is heard in a policy committee

Do the same when it is heard in a fiscal committee

Write or call when it is discussed in the full House/Senate

Write or call when a committee makes changes ... When it goes to the governor ... Throughout the budget process (funds to implement the bill need to be included in the budget)



Policy committee: Is this bill a good idea? Will it help people?



Fiscal: How much will it cost? Is it worth the money?
