2 activist frameworks

Disability rights

What: Laws to prevent discrimination. Relies on institutions and government to enact/follow laws

Qualities:

- Self-representation
- Self-determination
- Integration
- Independent living
- Single-issue identity

Disability Justice

What: Intersectional movement for collective liberation. Relies on activists to speak to lived experience

Qualities:

- Unity
- Less hierarchical
- Egalitarian
- Collective determination
- Intersectional

Disability rights

Focus: Work within current systems to provide employment, educational, housing and other services for people with disabilities

Who: Historically, a mostly white-led movement for people with a defined disability

Idea advanced: An individual with a disability is a human first and disability is a natural part of humanity.

Disability justice

Focus: Redesign systems to root out ableism, racism, homophobia, transmisogyny, etc, to ensure people with intersectional identities are welcomed and to dismantle systems of exploitation

Who: Centers on disabled people of color, women, people who identify as LGBTQ+, immigrants and other historically excluded groups

Idea advanced: Able-bodied supremacy formed in relation to other systems of domination and exploitation.

Principles of disability justice

- 1. Intersectionality
- 2. Leadership of most impacted
- 3. Anti-capitalist politics: worth is not dependent on ability to produce
- 4. Cross-movement solidarity
- 5. Recognizing wholeness: disabled people are not "less than" because of their disability

- 6. Sustainability: movement depends on the community
- 7. Commitment to cross-disability solidarity
- 8. Interdependence: support and community are important
- 9. Collective access: needs are welcomed, acknowledged, respected
- 10. Collective liberation: no one left behind

Disability justice

A disability justice framework understands that:

- All bodies are unique and essential.
- All bodies have strengths and needs that must be met.
- We are powerful, not despite the complexities of our bodies, but because of them.

 All bodies are confined by ability, race, gender, sexuality, class, nation state, religion, and more, and we cannot separate them.
