

Better questions, better action

There are lots of ways to engage They start with questions:

- What do you know?
- How do you feel?
- What do you want to do?



The rules

- Ask as many questions as you can
- Do not stop to discuss, judge, or answer any questions
- Write down every question exactly as it pops into your mind
- Change any statement into a question





Think about the prompt



Craft as many questions as you can about the prompt



Categorize your questions

Is it closed ended?

A yes or no question?

Is it open-ended?

Does it require an explanation?



Prioritize your questions



Choose 3

Think about why you chose those 3



Name your rationale for choosing those 3

Did they seem most urgent? Were you most curious about them? Why did you choose those 3?



Observe

Were your priority questions at the beginning, middle or end of your original list?

Think about and name the advantages and disadvantages of asking open-ended vs yes or no questions

The prompt: Children flourishing

Definition:


Flourish – verb – To grow or develop in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as the result of a particularly favorable environment





Ask as many questions as you can

- Take 5-10 minutes
- Do not stop to discuss, judge, or answer any questions
- Write down questions exactly as they come to you
- Change any statement into a question



Once you have your list of questions, number them

Categorize your questions

- Is it a yes/no question? MarkC, for closed
- Is it open-ended?Mark O, for open
- Switch them.
 Change closed to open, and open to closed

- What are pros and cons of open versus closed?
- You have 5 minutes

Prioritize your questions

- Think about the prompt. Pick 3 questions
- Mark them with an X
- Why did you select those 3?
 Write down your reason

- Observe: Where did your 3 questions fall on the initial list?
- You have 2 minutes



Reflect

How will you, or could you, use your questions



What did you learn?

What did you notice about your thinking as you went through the process?



Did you have questions that asked WHY?

These often explore legitimacy. Does something need to be the way it is?



Do you have a lot of questions about the decision-making process?

These explore transparency. Who is making the decision? What criteria are they using?



Do your questions center on YOUR role in the situation?

These often explore opportunities to participate.

Advocacy takes different forms

- Self-advocacy in school or work, or with navigating services
- Legislative or policy changes
- Protest
- Persuasion

Your questions can help you focus on what you find compelling, or what actions you want to take
