Staying Safe

Autistic children often have a different relationship with risk than their peers. Here's how to keep them safe:

Focus on making your yard <u>accessible</u>.

- Prevent dangerous <u>wandering or elopement</u> by installing a fence and a safe, quiet place to sit, such as a playhouse.
- Allergies are common in autistic children, and they may not have the tools to let you
 know they're suffering, so pay attention to <u>allergy symptoms</u> and talk to your doctor if
 you're concerned.

Embracing Their Needs

Work with your little one to figure out the most comfortable yard possible:

- <u>Do not surprise them</u> with a new space: Communicate with your child (verbally or nonverbally) so they know you're changing the yard.
- Sensory experiences can make or break your yard, so avoid unpleasant textures, <u>strong</u> <u>scents</u>, or sounds they don't like, and include those they do.
- If you can, find ways to include things they're interested in, such as setting up a space to perform <u>interesting science experiments</u>.

Creating an autism-friendly backyard is a fantastic display of love and solidarity. The world is full of loud noises, uncomfortable textures, and difficult social encounters, all of which can leave autistic children feeling overstimulated, misunderstood, and out of place. With the right design, you can ensure that your little one has a space where they know they always belong.

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
